

FRANKLIN ROAD IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

In May 2016, the California Transportation Commission allocated \$368,000 in Active Transportation Program grant funding for the Franklin Road Improvements Project. The goal of this project is to improve pedestrian and bicycle safety to and from Andros Karperos School. To achieve this goal, the project included a new highvisibility crosswalk and crosswalk warning system on Franklin Road at Nantucket Way, over 500 linear feet of new sidewalk, over 4,700 linear feet of Class II bicycle lanes and upgraded 17 curb ramps to meet current Americans with Disabilities Act standards. North Star Construction and Engineering, Inc. of Yuba City completed the project ahead of schedule and under budget with minimal impacts to the public.







SR-20 Median Project

- CalTrans previously placed asphalt in the existing median to reduce maintenance requirements
- City desires to construct and maintain median improvements along between Stafford Way and Clark Ave
- Improvement work will be similar in style to the existing Bridge Street medians, including stamped concrete, cobblestone, landscaping, and irrigation










Planning Projects



Fireworks Ordinance

- Increased enforcement by the Fire and Police Departments
- New Ordinance holding Responsible party of a residence or property liable for the illegal fire works
- \$1,000 Citation
- Creation of a public education campaign with the focus on educating the public on the dangers of illegal fireworks and the increased enforcement and citations
- Explore public and private partnerships for a regional public 4th of July celebrations

Proactive Enforcement

- Increased Fire and Police Staffing between July 1—July 4
- Use of yc311 application allowing community members to report Dangerous/Illegal Fireworks








4th of July Children's Parade

Responsible Party Component

- Owns, rents, leases or has possession of the residence or property
- Person in immediate control of residence or private property
- Person organizes, supervises, sponsors, conducts, allows. Controls access to illegal discharge or illegal storage of fireworks
- Violations and penalties not to exceed \$1,000



Boards and Commissions

PARKS & RECREATION COMMISSION

The Parks & Recreation Commission acts in an advisory capacity to the City Council and Community Services Department. The Commission shall recommend general policies concerning all parks & recreation properties, facilities, programs, and activities. Commissioners also serve as the City Tree Advisory Board. Applicants must reside within the corporate limits of the City.

SENIOR COMMISSION

The members of the Senior Commission focus on preserving and improving the quality of life for older citizens in the community. The Commission advises City Council on a wide range of issues relevant to older adults. The Commission also provides opportunities to educate seniors, their families and caregivers on these issues. Applicants must be at least 55 years of age & reside within the corporate limits of the City.

YOUTH COMMISSION

The Youth Commission acts in an advisory capacity to the City Council concerning issues relating to youth activities and involvement. This Commission works closely with the Parks and Recreation Department. Applicants must reside within the corporate limits of the City and be between the ages of 12 to 19.

APPLICATIONS

Applications will be accepted until <u>Friday May 26, 2017 at 5:00 p.m.</u> or until filled. Applicants will be interviewed by the Mayor and Vice Mayor prior to recommendation for appointment by the City Council.
