



## Background



- The City is an entitlement jurisdiction receiving annual federal formula grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
- The purpose of the CDBG is to provide decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expand economic opportunities primarily for low and moderate income persons.
- CDBG Objectives:
  - Benefit low- and moderate- income (LMI) persons
  - Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight
  - Meet a need having a particular urgency (to alleviate emergency conditions)

## **Yuba City Income Limits**



#### CDBG Definitions of Low and Moderate Income:

- Low income ≤50% of Area Median Income (AMI)
- Moderate income ≤ 80% of AMI

- For Sutter County, AMI is defined as \$75,000 for a four person household
  - Low Income (household of 4): \$37,500
  - Moderate Income (household of 4): \$60,000

## **HUD Funding**



- The City will receive \$628,525 for the 2022-2023 CDBG Program Year
- In accordance with HUD regulations:
  - A maximum of 20% of funds is allowed to be allocated to Program Administration. 15% Proposed for FY 22-23.
  - A maximum of 15% of funds may be allocated to Public Services, such as homeless-related services
  - Required to direct a minimum of 70% of the funding to low-moderate income persons/households
  - Funding is to be spent within the program year, per Federal guidelines

## **2022 CDBG Process**



1. Notice of Funding Available published in Appeal Democrat, sent to interested parties, and posted on City's website



2. Public workshop held on February 10,2022



**3.** Requests for Funding Applications due March 28, 2022



**6.** 30 Day Public Notice published on June 24<sup>th</sup> in Appeal Democrat and City Website



**5.** Draft 2022 Annual Action Plan prepared



**4.** Staff Committee reviewed, rated, and ranked applications



7. Council Review and Approval of 2022 Annual Action Plan



8. Submit Annual Action Plan and required documents to HUD for review by August 1<sup>st</sup> (Targeting July 25<sup>th</sup>).



9. Staff administers the CDBG 2022 program to meet funding requirements and deadlines

#### **Substantial Amendment**



- Transfer \$145,416.23 from 2019-2020Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation unexpended funds to be used for the upcoming 2022 PY programs and projects
  - Several loan payoffs received
  - Program management transition
  - Loan qualifications: housing price limit etc.
