Yuba City News

Animal Services

Yuba City will assume lead agency responsibilities for Animal Services in Sutter County starting July 1st this year. Yuba City is the largest investment partner (66%) in the new Sutter Animal Services Authority (SASA) with Live Oak and Sutter County. A new animal services facility is scheduled for completion in mid-August 2013. The Animal Services program has nine employees and an annual operating budget of \$1 million.

Public Records Act

The State Legislature on Friday, June 14th, voted to approve SB 71, a trailer bill attached to the 2013-2014 budget. The Governor's deadline to sign the legislation as a part of the overall budget approval is July 1st.

SB 71 recasts the Public Records Act (PRA) mandate provisions as optional "best practices"—eliminating the State's responsibility to reimburse local governments for these activities. Each year a local government would be required to either: (1) comply with the best practices or (2) announce at its first regularly scheduled public meeting that the local government will not meet the best practices.

Last year the Brown Act reimbursement for noticing was permanently eliminated. Yuba City continues to adhere to the Brown Act noticing requirements. It is likely that reimbursements for PRA requirements will also be eliminated in the near future.

5th Street Bridge Funding

The City is continuing to work with Caltrans to finalize the draft environmental document for replacing the 5th Street Bridge with a 4-lane structure. The draft environmental document will be circulated for public comments in July. Preliminary design activities in support of the environmental document are on-going. The City has secured approximately \$53 million of the estimated \$70 million in total project costs. City staff met with SACOG on June 10th to discuss options for securing the additional \$17 million required to replace the bridge. We will be looking to a current SACOG call for projects and Toll Credits from the Highway Bridge Program to reduce the amount of Local Funds required.

Sutter Basin Pilot Feasibility Study

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Sacramento District released the draft feasibility report and environmental impact report/supplemental environmental impact statement for the Sutter Basin Pilot Feasibility Study for public review, officially opening the 45-day public comment period, through Thursday, July 29, 2013.

The recommended alternative is consistent with SBFCA Implementation Plan. This Plan will implement flood risk management measures along the Feather River West Levee alignment over a distance of approximately 41 miles to help reduce the flood risk for nearly 100,000 people and more than 26,000 structures within the Biggs, Gridley, Live Oak and Yuba City communities.

Public meetings are currently being scheduled for this summer to discuss the document and accept public comments.

Water Employee Certification Compensation

The City has been working with employees to clarify and fairly compensate them for mandated certifications needed for water distribution. Certifications range from Distribution 1 (D-1) through Distribution 4 (D-4). Each certification brings with it increased levels of technical competencies and authorized abilities to work on our water distribution system. Incentives for certification and appropriate compensation(s) are being considered along with commiserate changes in job descriptions. This issue will be considered by the City Council at their meeting on July 16th.

EPA: California Needs \$44B in Water Infrastructure Improvements Over Next 20 Years

Local Governments - Exclusive — 11 June 2013

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has released the fifth edition of its Drinking Water Infrastructure Needs Survey and Assessment. In the report, which was last updated in 2007, California's water infrastructure needs increased from \$44.2 billion to \$44.5 billion. In terms of need, California topped all other states, and needs more than \$10 billion more than Texas, \$22 billion more than New York.

"A safe and adequate supply of drinking water in our homes, schools and businesses is essential to the health and prosperity of every American," said EPA Acting Administrator Bob Perciasepe in a statement that accompanied the release of the survey. "The survey EPA released today shows that the nation's water systems have entered a rehabilitation and replacement era in which much of the existing infrastructure has reached or is approaching the end of its useful life. This is a major issue that must be addressed so that American families continue to have the access they need to clean and healthy water sources."


In many cases, drinking water infrastructure was reported to be 50-100 years old.

California's needs are dominated by the cost of improving drinking water transmission, accounting for roughly \$26.7 billion. Treatment accounted for \$8.4 billion; storage needs totaled \$6.4 billion.

The survey provides a snapshot of each state, using a sample of water systems from each state. In California, we have 687 medium- and large- independent water systems. The report sampled 169 of those.
